DEVELOPING LEADERS

- 2 pastors were ordained
- 3 Synodically Authorized Ministers were approved
- 171 rostered & lay leaders participated in the Fall Theological Conference in November 2016
- 26 active ministry candidates across 6 seminaries are participating in the candidacy process
- 191 congregational leaders participated in the RENEW! event in Spring 2016
- 43 rostered leaders participated in the Emotional Intelligence Workshop



WELCA

FAMILY MATTERS

As we all know, it has been a long-standing tradition to serve oyster stew and chili following the Christmas program each year, and in 2016 I learned just how much it means to the members of our church when I threatened to cancel it.

For the record, it was not a threat that I felt good about by any means, but in my role as council president, I felt I had no choice. The date of the program and supper was drawing near and I simply did not have time to coordinate the effort, so I sent out an SOS email to the congregation with the threat of cancelling the supper part of the Christmas program, and from here I will let Carmen Howe tell the story as published in the January 2017 edition of The Messenger newsletter.

I wanted to share an amazing story of stewardship that I witnessed over these past two weeks at St. John's. It all began with the oyster stew and chili supper. It appeared that we had no one in charge of the supper. Lisa Dietrich sent out an email to everyone explaining the situation and my daughter Courtney said, "Well, if it means no chili and oyster stew supper then I will do it because I'm not willing to give that up."

Well, as her mother, I was so proud and decided that I would get the ball rolling and answer that email. That is when the volunteers just started rolling in - one email after another with donations of money, time and talent. The supper was planned and all donations in tact in a matter of two days.

The stewardship did not stop there. The night of the concert I noticed that the young adults of the congregation joined the Sunday School in sharing the Christmas story. That was so wonderful to witness.

After the concert, everyone came for fellowship and to enjoy the chili and oyster stew and what happened after that brought tears to my eyes. People were bringing their bowls up to be washed and asking, "What can I do to help?" Some people grabbed dish towels to help while others took down tables and put chairs away. We were cleaned up and home by 7:00 pm that night. It was the most heartwarming night of stewardship all the way around and that folks is what I love about my church family!

I found out later that another family was ready to step up and take charge of the oyster stew and chili supper but Carmen and her daughters beat them to it, which also speaks to what a remarkable church family we have!

In the end, the oyster stew and chili supper raised \$682 to be used to repair the back wall of the balcony.

COVER THEM WITH LOVE!

Ever since I started putting the Annual Report together, WELCA and the Circles have provided impressive lists of their stewardship accomplishments for the year, which always includes fabric and thread given to Lutheran World Relief. Every time I type that into the report, I wonder why send fabric and thread? Wouldn't it be more thoughtful to send clothes? Well, you know how sometimes when you lose something; you find it while looking for something else? I had a similar experience as I was looking at the Lutheran World Relief website and stumbled upon the story behind the donation of dress fabric and thread.

Turns out, Lutheran World Relief calls them "fabric kits" and as taken from their website, describes these kits as follows:

You've maybe heard the analogy about teaching someone to fish... well you can help teach a person to sew and provide the tools to earn an income and break out of poverty. Project Promise Fabric Kits are used in vocational training programs to teach young men and women useful, marketable skills. Cover them with love!

With a little more looking, I found that in 2016, 17,138 fabric kits were delivered to countries around the world, of which, 9,759 were shipped from Minnesota warehouses. That is 56% of the total...go Minnesota! 1,740 went to Burkina FASO (I had to Google this one to find out it is a country in Africa, formerly known as Upper Volta); 2,460 were shipped to DRC (another Google search told me this is the Democratic Republic of Congo, also in Africa) and 1,558 went to Peru.

St John's WELCA and the two circles do not stop at just donating the fabric and thread, they also donate money for shipping and the Lutheran World Relief website notes that it takes \$1 to ship one fabric kit.

We will never know how many lives are impacted by these simple fabric kits, but we know that at least 18 lives have been given an opportunity for a brighter future.

GODS WORK, OUR HANDS ... THE SEQUAL

We have had some very productive Sundays over the past few years with our participation in the ELCA's God's Work, Our Hands Sunday, but Norma Klaehn proves that it doesn't have to stop there. Here is her story...

In 2016, we needed to make flannel diapers for the layettes. It takes four diapers per layette, so we ordered a bolt of 27-inch wide flannel from Hancock Fabrics in Rochester, which was the only source we could find, and it was picked up by Carol Lantow. We also asked Dr. Mary Fargen if she needed diapers for her trip to Haiti. She did, so I began looking for funding.

As word spread that we needed funds for diapers for missions, responses came in. Marshall Church made a donation along with Gerald Meier who also gave funds. Gerald and a friend went down to lowa to a fabric shop and bought numerous ends of bolts of white flannel, which he donated. I also received a phone call from Hancock Fabrics asking if I still want diaper flannel. I told them yes, so Tam Klaehn picked it up for us. A resident where I live, Avene Nolte, asked a cousin in Iowa who has a Hancock store in her town, and she donated a bolt.

I can make the diapers on my serger, so there was no problem there, but I needed help in cutting them, especially when handling a bolt of fabric. So we, 8 residents of Cedar Court Apartments, formed a cutting party and in two mornings we cut 190 diapers - over 60 for St. John's, over 30 for Marshall, and 97 for Dr. Mary. We may be old, but don't count us out. So many from various faiths, areas, and abilities were involved, and when Dr. Mary returned, she gave us a party! GOD'S WORK, OUR HANDS.

INSPIRED BY PIZZA

Berne, Minnesota, as described by Wikipedia, is an unincorporated community in Dodge County, located near the junction of State Highway 57 ad Dodge County Road 24 (about 20 miles northwest of Rochester.) The community of Berne is deeply rooted in its Swiss heritage as evidenced by its name that is after Bern, Switzerland.

For over 50 years the members of the Zwingli United Church of Christ hosted an annual celebration and tribute to their heritage called Swissfest, but then they decided to try something new and to say this new idea was a success would be an understatement.

In 2012, members of Zwingli started serving pizza, made from scratch and baked in an outdoor wood-fired oven. On any given Wednesday evening from June through August, this event can draw people by the hundreds and the proceeds from selling pizza go to help the church and various charities.

A couple of years ago, Doug and Linda Johnson made the trip to Berne for some pizza and while there, Linda noticed how people were enjoying their pizza and the music in the picnic-like setting and it occurred to her that perhaps St. Johns, with its beautiful setting conveniently located just off Interstate 90, could also offer something like this. But rather than just tell people about it, she offered pizza money for someone else to experience it for themselves. So, Jon and I and Barb Stephenson loaded up our lawn chairs and headed for Berne.

When we arrived, we almost turned around and came back home because of the number of cars that lined the roads and that were parked in a grassy area across the road from the church, but we decided to stay and check it out.

We waited for just over an hour for our pizza, but it did not seem that long because we were entertained by the people watching. From sitting on blankets to the four women who set up a table and chairs, complete with a table cloth and a vase with flowers, wine glasses and a bottle of wine, everyone there was making it their own fun experience. It was amazing.

The council did discuss the feasibility of doing something like this at St. Johns, but in reality, it was just **too good** of an idea, meaning, if we drew crowds like they were drawing in Berne, we would not have the manpower to keep up. There was also concern in the cost of building and maintaining an outdoor pizza oven.

But Linda is not a quitter. She continued to give it some thought and in 2016 took her inspiration from the Berne wood-fired pizza, switched up the menu and the "Stock the Food Shelves Italian Serenade" was born. A good friend and neighbor to St. John's, Jeannine Guern, volunteered to make lasagna and with the help of a small group of volunteers from St. Johns, a date was set and plans were put into motion. All that was needed was one of those beautiful summer evenings. The weather did not cooperate as it rained ...steadily, just as the weather forecast predicted, so the event was moved indoors to the parish hall.

The rain did not dampen the spirits of those who were there to serve or those who attended as it wasn't long before the parish hall filled with a joyful atmosphere thanks in part to the area musical groups, from high school students to retired teachers, who provided the serenade portion of the evening with some great and festive music.

This event not only made for a fun evening, it also raised \$566 for the Southland Area Food Shelf and the leftovers fed 88 people at the Salvation Army!


